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traversing philosophical boundaries is the most comprehensive multicultural text reader for introductory philosophy addressing  
 six primary philosophical concerns the self reality epistemology ethics politics and religion this book contains not only many  
 readings from the western canon but essential readings from many cultural perspectives not typically included in introductory  
 philosophy classes as well asian african african american latin american and feminist traditions are broadly represented and  
 fully integrated into the exploration of these fundamental matters

at columbia university in 1906 william james gave a highly confrontational speech to the american philosophical association  
 apa he ignored the technical philosophical questions the audience had gathered to discuss and instead addressed the topic of  
 human energy tramping on the rules of academic decorum james invoked the work of amateurs read testimonials on the  
 benefits of yoga and alcohol and concluded by urging his listeners to take up this psychological and physiological problem  
 what was the goal of this unusual speech rather than an oddity francesca bordogna asserts that the apa address was  
 emblematic it was just one of many gestures that james employed as he plowed through the barriers between academic  
 popular and pseudoscience as well as the newly emergent borders between the study of philosophy psychology and the  
 science of man bordogna reveals that james s trespassing of boundaries was an essential element of a broader intellectual  
 and social project by crisscrossing divides she argues james imagined a new social configuration of knowledge a better  
 society and a new vision of the human self as the academy moves toward an increasingly interdisciplinary future william  
 james at the boundaries reintroduces readers to a seminal influence on the way knowledge is pursued

religion within the boundaries of mere reason is a key element of the system of philosophy which kant introduced with his

critique of pure reason and a work of major importance in the history of western religious thought it represents a great philosopher's attempt to spell out the form and content of a type of religion that would be grounded in moral reason and would meet the needs of ethical life it includes sharply critical and boldly constructive discussions on topics not often treated by philosophers including such traditional theological concepts as original sin and the salvation or justification of a sinner and the idea of the proper role of a church this volume presents it and three short essays that illuminate it in new translations by allen wood and george di giovanni with an introduction by robert merrihew adams that locates it in its historical and philosophical context

how is it that the world is conceived as exclusively populated by objects e.g. books cars numbers and people while cognition is first and foremost a dynamic process inquiring into the reified universe dr neuman explores questions of mind reality knowledge and signification in a provocative stimulating and humorous way drawing on various domains such as systems research semiotics philosophy and complexity sciences dr neuman is touching basic questions of our being in the world as cognate creatures and presents a novel theory of the mind as a boundary phenomenon following the footsteps of gregory bateson and valentine volosinov the book propagates a process oriented theory of the mind in a way that has never been presented before in this context new and creative solutions are presented for a variety of old philosophical problems such as what is the mind why do we use different signs for the same object across different cultures and how is it possible to think on our thinking without getting into problems such as an infinite regression

looking at the dialogue between philosophy and theology this book addresses the contemporary reshaping of intellectual boundaries and explores human experience in a post christian era it points to ways of reconfiguring both traditional reason faith oppositions and those between interpretation text and language and experience

are animals capable of wonder can they be said to possess language and reason what can animals teach us about how to live well how can they help us to see the limitations of human civilization is it possible to draw firm distinctions between humans and animals and how might asking and answering questions like these lead us to rethink human animal relations in

an age of catastrophic ecological destruction in this accessible and engaging book matthew calarco explores key issues in the philosophy of animals and their significance for our contemporary world he leads readers on a spirited tour of historical and contemporary philosophy ranging from plato to donna haraway and from the cynics to the jains calarco unearths surprising insights about animals from a number of philosophers while also underscoring ways in which the philosophical tradition has failed to challenge the dogma of human centeredness along the way he indicates how mainstream western philosophy is both complemented and challenged by non western traditions and noncanonical theories about animals throughout calarco uses examples from contemporary culture to illustrate how philosophical theories about animals are deeply relevant to our lives today the boundaries of human nature shows readers why philosophy can help transform not just the way we think about animals but also how we interact with them

the boundary between semantics and pragmatics has been important since the early twentieth century but in the last twenty five years it has become the central issue in the philosophy of language this anthology collects classic philosophical papers on the topic along with recent key contributions it stresses not only the nature of the boundary but also its importance for philosophy generally

throughout the centuries philosophers and poets alike have defended an essential difference rather than a porous transition between the human and animal attempts to assign essential properties to humans e g language reason or morality often reflected ulterior aims to defend a privileged position for humans this book shifts the traditional anthropocentric focus of philosophy and literature by combining the questions what is human and what is animal what makes this collection unique is that it fills a lacuna in critical animal studies and the growing field of ecocriticism it is the first collection that establishes a productive encounter between philosophical perspectives on the human animal boundary and those that draw on fictional literature the objective is to establish a dialogue between those disciplines with the goal of expanding the imaginative scope of human animal relationships the contributions thus do not only trace and deconstruct the boundaries dividing humans and nonhuman animals they also present the reader with alternative perspectives on the porous continuum and surprising reversal
